Objectives

This subject aims to help students retrieve relevant information from a range of authentic Japanese language texts not only by enabling them to develop an introductory reading skill that is required of them to attain the relevant information but also by empowering them to identify ways in which more complex authentic texts than those accessible at the introductory level become to a certain extent intelligible. The subject also aims to help students engage in writing simple Japanese texts which are useful in real-life everyday situations.

Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the subject, students should be able to:

Category A Professional / academic knowledge and skills

- (a) read and write fluently the Japanese writing system kana and accustom themselves to readings of Japanese words of Chinese origin as well as English loanwords in a range of simple authentic and constructed text examples;
- (b) write simple Japanese language texts that satisfy some everyday communicative purposes;
- (c) identify generic structure of a range of different text types for global comprehension to develop interest in reading Japanese language texts.

Category B Attributes for all-roundness

- (d) the skills involved in accessing authentic written texts;
- (e) the skills required for collaborative and multidisciplinary work;
- (f) the ability to engage in independent and reflective learning and problem solving

Teaching / Learning Methodology

The subject is composed of two parts: lectures offer learning content that is expanded through various activities and tasks in the subsequent seminars. Mode of teaching and learning is highly interactive, involving students in pair/group work and discussion in which learning tasks are collectively completed. Where appropriate, students are expected to present their understanding of the content of relevant texts individually and/or in pair/group.

Different modes of learning not only enhance your language skills specified in the Intended Learning Outcomes but also enable you to deal with problem solving individually and collaboratively.

Tasks will be given out throughout the semester, please follow the instructions from the L2L email and make sure you check the deadline of each tasks.

Quiz (20%)

There are 3 quizzes throughout the semester. Students will be tested on the course's learning content including reading and writing Hiragana and Katakana, writing short sentences, verb conjugations and reading aloud a short narrative text. The quizzes will be progressive to accompany students learning of the Japanese kana system from simple words to short phrases and sentences. All quizzes will be conducted during normal class hours. There will be NO supplementary quiz under any circumstances.

Homework (15%)

To prepare students for the quizzes, there are 3 sets of homework throughout the semester. The homework is designed to help students familiarized with the Japanese kana system through reading and writing short sentences. Students are expected to use the tools introduced in class such as online dictionaries to complete their homework. Homework is due one week after it is distributed to students. Submission must be made during normal "seminar" hours. No late submission will be accepted under

any circumstances.

Writing task (20%)

You are required to complete 2 writing tasks that enable you to practice composition. Both compositions must be submitted via email that allows you to engage in "doing" something. In Writing 1, you are to report on your learning Japanese experiences, and in Writing 2, you share your dream. Both writing tasks require you to apply your reading and writing skills. Both writing tasks must be hand-written. Typed composition will not be accepted.

Examination (20%)

A 50-minute final examination will be conducted to test your working knowledge on Japanese. The exam consists of two parts. In the first part, students are examined on their reading skills through a combination of multiple choices and short text reading of authentic texts that belong to the different text types covered in class. In the second part, students are required to write a short text within the context of everyday life communication. The examination will be held in Week 13 during normal seminars. See below for missing examination due to sickness and/or misadventure.

Active class participation (5%)

Students are required to attend all lectures and seminars. If you are unable to attend a class due to misadventure, a written explanation supported by relevant proof (e.g. a doctor's certificate for sick leave) must be submitted. Absence from class without such proof will result in mark deduction. Each absence from seminars will result in deduction of 5 marks from subject's overall mark. Maximum penalty of deduction of mark is 30 marks.

In order for students to make significant contribution to their collective learning in the classroom context, they need to actively engage in various learning tasks and, where appropriate, voice their views by initiating and responding. This assessment component will assess student's active participation in this regard. Active class participation will be assessed based on the following criteria:
